# From the Executive Director

## Fundraising = An Opportunity to Hear and Learn

During the past six months, I have spent quite a bit of time working with this year's Birthday Luncheon Committee to seek support for NCJW. With **Kristen Fagelman** as Chair, **Phyllis Bernstein** as Underwriting Chair and their dynamic fund raising team, we already have raised a significant amount and brought in dozens of new donors. We are fortunate to have these dynamic women at the helm. I have

been impressed with the very hands-on approach that they have taken, reaching out to prospective donors by phone calls and emails. In most instances, they have requested a face-to-face meeting to present our case. Their successes have made me appreciate anew the critical importance of the personal touch in fundraising.

Fundraising, or *development* as it is euphemistically called in the nonprofit world, is a terribly misunderstood activity. It can make grown men and women, mature and successful corporate executives, committed volunteers and board members break out in a cold sweat. Many people think of it like used car sales. Others feel it borders on the inappropriate way to talk to people about money. However, as our Birthday Luncheon Committee has so ably demonstrated, *development* is not "sales." *Development* is about building, sustaining and enjoying relationships. It is about meeting people and sharing our enthusiasm for NCJW with them.

*Development* is about conversations and actively listening to other people's stories. Last month, several prospective donors gave me new insights into NCJW. One enthusiastic donor commented that "the thing I like about NCJW is that it is an "incubator." She chose to support NCJW because of our historic willingness to take risks and create needed programs. Another prospective donor explained that she had chosen to support the Birthday Luncheon because she had seen **Adlene Harrison's** name listed as one of the event's Honorary Chairs. She explained that 25 years ago Adlene had been a NCJW volunteer who had helped establish the agency

for which she now volunteers. Thank you, Adlene! And yet another prospect commented that he would always be grateful to NCJW Dallas because of the role our volunteers had played in changing the process for considering a refugee's status in the courtroom. These snippets of history, seen from an outsider's perspective, help enrich our message and affirm the value of the work we do.

Bottom line, *Development* is also necessary. We are fortunate this year to have a dynamic Birthday Luncheon Host Committee. Now it is up to the rest of us to ensure that our luncheon on January 31<sup>st</sup> is a huge success. Let's reach out to prospective donors, let's share our enthusiasm for NCJW and, while we are at it, let's enjoy the opportunity to hear and learn from others' stories. I am grateful to each of you for all you do to create these stories.

## About Our Keynote Speaker

Say the name Erin Brockovich, and you think, strong, tough, stubborn and sexy. Erin is all that and definitely more. She is a modern-day “David” who loves a good brawl with today’s “Goliaths.” She thrives on being the voice for those who don’t know how to yell. She is a rebel. She is a fighter. She is a mother. She is a woman. She is you and me.

It’s been 15 years since Julia Roberts starred in the Oscar-winning tour de force *Erin Brockovich*. The film turned an unknown legal researcher into a 20th century icon by showcasing how her dogged persistence was the impelling force behind the largest medical settlement lawsuit in history. Since then, Erin hasn’t been resting on her laurels. This brave woman doesn’t apologize for who she is. She has always loved going head to head with the big boys and was never intimidated by their bravado. She learned how to come out on top from her tight-knit mid-western family in Lawrence, Kansas. Erin was the youngest child of an industrial engineer father and journalist mother. Her parents always believed that she could do anything she set her mind to if she learned to focus her amazing energy.

The story and film made “Erin Brockovich” a household name. Over time, Ms. Brockovich realized she could use her new-found fame to spread positive messages of personal empowerment and to encourage others to stand up and make a difference. As president of Brockovich Research & Consulting, Ms. Brockovich is currently involved in numerous environmental projects worldwide.

## Jacquielynn Floyd to Receive the Pioneering Partner Award

The Greater Dallas Section’s Pioneering Partner Award is presented annually to an individual or organization in recognition of major contributions to the Dallas Community consistent with NCJW’s mission; strong leadership in bringing together and working with diverse groups and individuals and motivating others in the community to strive for social justice.

Jacquielynn Floyd, *The Dallas Morning News* Metro Columnist, is being honored for excelling in each of these criteria, consistently and sensibly offering eloquent and insightful opinions, commentary and leadership. She articulates relevant issues and topics, which may or may not be current news, with a laser-like sense of right and wrong.

Jacquielynn began working as a journalist in 1980 when she launched her career at the *Austin American Statesman* as an obituary clerk. She served at the *Dallas Times Herald* and then *The Dallas Morning News* where she became a columnist in 1990. She has been named the best in the state by the Texas Press Managing Editors, the Headliners Foundation and the Press Club of Dallas.

In 2011, The American Society of News Editors awarded Jacquielynn its distinguished award for commentary/column writing. ASNE judges said she won the national award because of her “exceptional reporting and writing that focused on local issues to tell universal truths.” The judges noted that “in deeply felt columns on criminal justice, family, immigration and prejudice, Floyd wrote convincingly about regular folks who felt the sting of injustice and whose lives were disrupted by violence, trauma and bureaucratic incompetence.”

Throughout her career, Jacquielynn has articulated and championed what is sensible and what is right. Her readers are enlightened by her deep empathy for the oppressed and abused, commitment to individual and civil liberties, support for empowerment for women and her commitment to the well-being of women, children and families. Her readers are inspired by her ability to capture just the right words to stir them to change their attitudes, habits and subsequently their own lives and the lives of so many in our community.

With her folksy style, she makes her readers feel as if they were visiting an old friend who has the wisdom always to get to the heart of the matter. Examples of titles of her poignant writings include: “This is Dallas, this is our city, and we don’t let terrorism win;” “Why witch hunts can’t kill Planned Parenthood;” “Texas foster kids need a political miracle” and “The cruelty of demonizing desperate refugees.”

In her opinions, Jacquielynn gives a voice to those who have been silenced and whose stories are often left untold because they lack power. In her writing, she paints vibrant portraits of women who are marginalized in the shadows of abuse. In her advocacy, she has worked without ceasing to protect children from abuse. When asked about why she is such a remarkable voice for children who suffer injustice in the child welfare system, she replied: “If you love children, you’d love the children you can’t see or hear.”

Clearly, Jacquielynn Floyd is a powerful, eloquent and reasoned voice that deserves to be honored and continued to be revered.

## Mitzvah Moments

Mitzvah Moments is the result of individuals hearing about the great works already being accomplished by NCJW and their desire to be a part of it. At the January 2016 Birthday Luncheon, a group of dynamic women, already deeply entrenched in the Jewish community, heard about many of the NCJW's current projects, and they decided to grow the list by building on its experience in coordinating community service events. This group of friends, and friends-of-friends, now participate in activities that provide an opportunity for socializing while doing mitzvot for others. Each community service opportunity can stand alone, or be a repeat event.

Thus far, the group has volunteered at Legacy Willow Bend. Scrapbooks were created to be on display during the Willow Bend Residents Knitting Club annual distribution event. In addition, participants also organized Rosh Hashanah gift boxes that included honey cakes for Legacy-at-home clients.

Future projects include making lunches in January for Hunger Busters, a Dallas-based charity focused on fueling children's futures by providing a much-needed third meal of the day to food-insecure children. The February project will be to provide and serve lunch for families at Ronald McDonald House, a non-profit that provides a temporary home for families of hospitalized children.

Each mitzvah project is completed in 2-4 hours once a month. Participants are welcome to offer ideas, be involved in planning, or just show up and help complete the task at hand. This project, newly organized in 2016, already has begun to touch the hearts of many in the Dallas community.

## Kids in Court

How does one help protect an already traumatized family from experiencing further trauma? How does a community intervene in the cycle of child abuse?

More than twenty years ago, members of the National Council of Jewish Women, Greater Dallas Section (NCJW) set out to address these questions. The resulting program, **Kids in Court**, was designed to help children aged 2 through 18 who may have been victims of felony abuse successfully cope with the challenges of testifying in Court. The goals of the program are: 1) to give a child victim confidence, strength and courage by helping the child and family become more familiar with and comfortable in the courtroom environment; 2) to prevent any further trauma to the child during the process of giving testimony ; and 3) to enable the child to be a more effective witness.

On five weekend mornings each year, NCJW volunteers join prosecutors and other members of the Child Abuse Unit of the Dallas County District Attorney's Office, counselors and others from the Dallas Children's Advocacy Center and volunteers from Bikers Against Child Abuse to help child victims and their caregivers prepare for their day in court. In what would typically be mostly empty courthouses, families, volunteers and a service dog named Roper assemble. Following introductions, attendees are divided into age- and interest-appropriate groups. The youngest children remain in the courtroom in which we've gathered while teenagers are sent to another and parents and caregivers move to other courtrooms (depending on their choice of English or Spanish) where they meet with experienced prosecutors and counselors.

NCJW provides all of the materials, including the print matter and the pizza lunch that closes each program. Through its enthusiastic volunteer members' presence at each session and its ongoing funding of all program expenses, NCJW continues to support Dallas County's commitment to providing our youngest citizens a safe living environment and to prosecuting vigorously those who threaten it.

When children can testify without fear or emotional harm, when families are willing to report abuse because they have confidence in the safety and support of the judicial system, their world and the community at large becomes a better place.

NCJW members can volunteer for one or more **Kids in Court** sessions, welcoming the families, helping the young children in their roleplay, and serving pizza to all attendees. Right now we have a special need for one or two volunteers with writing and graphic arts skills as we prepare a **Kids in Court** Administrator's Guide for Dallas County and other interested communities.

# Community Service

## Hello Israel

*Hello Israel* is a national volunteer program that has been introducing 6th graders to the country of Israel for over 25 years. Each social studies lesson presents facts about Israel in an entertaining and interactive manner, supplementing the curriculum on the Middle East. Working in pairs after a brief training and using scripts and visual aids, the volunteer presenters teach the students about the history, geography, culture, language, politics, and economy of Israel. History comes alive as the presenters encourage students to participate by directing questions, by demonstration, and by role-playing.

Of great interest are the authentic items brought in from Israel that are put on display for all to see and examine, including books, menus, coins, Dead Sea salts, soda cans and wrapped gum. These products all bear familiar brand names spelled out in the Hebrew alphabet

Students become participants in a mock archaeological dig, turning up "sand" (oatmeal) while searching for artifacts buried beneath. The program concludes with the students learning and practicing the Hora, a traditional Israeli dance.

Including no religious or political bias, the goal of this program, aside from its educational benefits, is to present the people of Israel in a favorable light by simply giving the facts. Currently being presented at numerous schools in the Dallas and Richardson ISDs, Hello Israel is always looking for additional adult volunteers for its educational community service projects. With a time commitment of about two hours per session, volunteers have the benefit of choosing dates and schools for their volunteer work.

A person from the Irving School District HIPPY program goes into the family home EVERY week to teach the curriculum to the parent who in turn teaches their child. The parents sign up that he/she will spend at least 15 minutes a day teaching the curriculum to their child." Dallas Section volunteers assist families with appropriate curriculum and field trips for HIPPY, including visits to the DMA, Nasher, Perot and Arboretum.

## The Reba M. Wadel Scholarship Fund

Education, children and social work were three of Reba Wadel's lifetime priorities.

Reba Mallison Wadel was born in 1990 in Longview, Texas. She was always active in Dallas civic and Jewish charitable organizations. She chaired the Women's Division of the Dallas Section of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. She was Vice President of NCJW, Dallas Section, and of the Dallas Community Chest (now the United Way). During WWII, Reba Wadel served as the unpaid Director of Volunteers for the Dallas branch of the U.S. Office of Civilian Defense. She died while returning from a UJA meeting in New York when her plane crash-landed at Love Field in Dallas on November 29, 1949.

Improving the quality of life for women children and families is part of NCJW, Greater Dallas Section's mission. One of the many efforts in striving for this is through the education of women studying in the field of early childhood development or family sciences. In 1990, NCJW Greater Dallas Section established the Reba M. Wadel Scholarship Fund which assists graduate students at Texas Women's University and University of Texas at Arlington in the field of child development and social work.

Contributors to the Reba M. Wadel Scholarship Fund can be assured that their dollars are going towards educating future social workers whose education has furthered their knowledge to improve the "quality of life for women, children and families."
