During the past year, I have observed this phenomenon innumerable times through the words, voices and reports of NCJW volunteers. Let me share just a few of the inspiring stories I have heard from our volunteers this year:

HIPPY Co-Chairs, Syl Benenson and Carol Tobias, can take great pride in the growth of the HIPPY program during the past year. As a result of their efforts to meet with Community Outreach Centers throughout Dallas, they have increased the number of families served and received additional funding for their efforts.

When Food + Fit = Fun Co-Chairs, Marlene Cohen, Liz Cooper, Sharan Goldstein, and Robin Zweig,

learned last summer that they would no longer be able to deliver F+F=F within the Richardson School District, they turned lemons into lemonade. By reaching out to neighborhood agencies, they were able to arrange to deliver a new and very successful variation of their program for students at the Vickery Meadow Learning Center. At the printers as I write this letter is a new F+F=F brochure that will enable them to promote their services even more widely. They are thrilled with the new direction.

NCJW National Convention

Twelve intrepid NCJW Dallas women returned from National Convention, held in Atlanta March 23-25, inspired, physically tired, but energized to continue our work repairing the world. From first time convention delegate Stacy Barnett, NCJW's "Leading the Way Board Fellow" to our own Pat Peiser who has been coming to NCJW conventions since 1948, for all of us, convention was inspiring, enlightening and energizing.

We voted on bylaws and resolutions, mixed and mingled with sections from across the country and gathered ideas and information.

Speakers ranged from Lumah Mufleh, a gay Muslim woman who is the CEO and founding director of Fugees Family, Inc, a nonprofit organization that uses the power of soccer, education and community to empower refugee children to successfully integrate into the United States. Her success made us cheer, but her fear for what is happening now in our country to these children was palpable.

Texas' own Kathy Miller made us proud as a panelist discussing what we can do to make a difference in the current political climate. We heard from Hillary Rodham Clinton via video as she accepted the "Woman Who Dared Award" and reminded us of her long association with NCJW.

The story of a Jewish women lawyer and the obstacles she had to overcome inspired us and made us appreciate why we must be vigilant in protecting our rights as women. This is the story of the "NCJW Lifetime Achievement Award" honoree The Honorable Phyllis Kravitch Judge, US Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, who is 96.

A discussion of the Israeli Arab situation in Israel was well represented by Ghaida Rinawie-Zoabi, Executive Director, Inaz Center for Professional Arab Local Government and Liel Even-Zohar Executive Director WePower; two powerful women, one Palestinian, one Israeli. Their insight into women in Israel and the challenge of these two cultures was fascinating.

Concurrent sessions on everything from fundraising, community organizing, messaging, community service projects and advocacy made delegates excited about the possibilities of new directions and tweaks to our current projects.

Meeting other NCJW members and sharing ideas, hopes and aspirations are what truly make NCJW conventions so meaningful. Each of us felt energized by the impact that NCJW has in our own communities and in the nation at large. Delegates appreciated the experience of personal growth, the inspiration of our leaders of the last 120 years, the opportunity to meet incredible smart, strong women, who are dedicated to repairing the world.

Culminating the convention and our true inspiration was the Leadership Gala and the evening's featured speaker, recipient of the "Faith and Humanity Award", Representative John Lewis of Georgia. Representative Lewis continues to be a leader in protecting human rights for all people and a voice for doing the right thing in Washington. He reminded us that it is women who change the world and we must keep this house, our nation upright. When he left the stage and the music of Happy was played it was a spontaneous dance party surrounding the Representative, joyful and hopeful, truly a great way to end the convention.

NCJW Day on the Hill 2017

Every other year the Texas Legislature is in session. In conjunction with the Legislative session, NCJW goes to Austin to advocate for women, families, and children in Texas. This year our issues were Reform the Child Protective Services/ Foster Care System, Human Trafficking, Reproductive Justice, and Education. Sixty-six NCJW women from the four Texas sections; Austin, Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio; went to see our various legislators on March 7th.

In preparation for our visits, we spent the previous afternoon being educated and inspired on the four issues on our agenda.

Ms. Dimple Patel of Texas Protects spoke on what was needed to fix and improve the Child Protective Services/ Foster Care System. She advised us on the good and questionable parts of the reform bills being introduced.

Rabbi Alan Freedman, Board Chair of Planned Parenthood Greater Texas, spoke on the Jewish objection to the requirement to bury fetal tissue after an abortion or miscarriage.

Kathy Miller, Executive Director of Texas Freedom Network spoke on the "Bathroom Bill" and school vouchers.

Nan Little Kirkpatrick, Executive Director of the TEA Fund provided us with advocacy training, as well as being an inspiring dinner speaker. The TEA fund is a non-profit organization, which provides funds for women in North Texas to be able to get an abortion. Nan told us of the hardships faced by women in Texas since so many clinics have closed.

We ended the day of training with a celebratory dinner where we gave three awards to outstanding women who represent the values and ideals of NCJW. Eileen Novitt Muslin of NCJW Houston received the Belief in Action Award. This award is given to a member who has been so involved and dedicated to NCJW over the years that it is part of her DNA. Texas State Representative Senfronia Thompson received the Texas Trail Blazer Award. The Texas Trailblazer is given to an elected official who goes above and beyond their office to insure a better life for women, families and children. Kathryn Griffin Grinan was the Woman Who Dared. That award is given to a woman who has overcome obstacles to make a difference.

Thank you NCJW....

The NCJW Board of Directors has approved a new effort in conjunction with Temple Emanuel and SMU Law School to help immigrant families in the Dallas area deal with their new world of concern of deportation and impact on their families. Thanks to Cheryl Pollman, NCJW has been asked to assist with the children of these parents while they attend the "Know Your Rights" presentations. Thanks to the SHARE fund, NCJW is providing games, crayons, and books to keep the children of immigrant families busy while their parents attend these presentations and begin to make family preparedness plans in case of detention or deportation. Under recent Executive Orders, undocumented immigrants face the real possibility of being detained and quickly deported, and separated from their families. This is an anxious time for parents and their children, and these presentations provide important, accurate information and the appropriate documentation that immigrant families need right now. Being able to bring their children to these presentations allows parents to attend without the concern of childcare, and the separation anxiety caused by leaving them at home. Volunteers are needed to help keep these kids busy and safe during these presentations. In addition, volunteers such as notaries, attorneys, and bilingual individuals are needed to assist at these presentations and family preparedness workshops. If you have any of these skills and a couple of hours to give, you can make a tremendous difference in the lives of these immigrant families. Community Service

Introducing the Suitcase Project: We're on a Roll!

Imagine being in a situation where your life depends on leaving with your few possessions in a trash bag or with only the clothes on your back. The Suitcase Project, a new initiative of NCJW Dallas Section that grew out of the work of the Research and Development Committee will help these women and children.

This is a new program for the Dallas Section, which will be integrated into the ongoing work of the WACHS Committee, and will provide a helping hand for women escaping abusive or trafficking situations. Gently used suitcases will be donated, and will serve as a symbol of moving on toward a new life and creating stability and safety for those involved. This innovative project services two populations:

- Those either entering or leaving the agency who are moving on to the next step toward independence
- Those moving from a shelter to their own apartment

Volunteers are needed to purchase, using NCJW-provided funds, listed items that will either go toward:

- tote bags and personal care items for those continuing their journey
- providing basic items needed to set up an apartment

This program is designed to meet the needs of women and their families sheltered by Mosaic Family Services, a foundation that offers emergency or transitional housing for women and children who have come from domestic violence or trafficking situations. These women and children are on a journey to an independent life that is healthy and safe, and prepares their families to move their lives forward in positive

ways. Through the establishment of an ongoing multifaceted program, the Dallas Section will help Mosaic meet minimal, modest material needs of the women and children leaving abusive and trafficking situations to enable them to start their new lives with a sense of dignity.

NCJW's partnership with Mosaic will enable women to change their life's circumstances and improve their futures immeasurably. After this program is piloted, it has the potential to expand to include additional organizations.

This community service project, currently in development, was identified by the R&D Committee after a year of extensive research and interviews with community leaders. It will address critical needs of low income, underserved families in the West Dallas area.
