President's Perspective

This summer has been filled with highs and lows for each of us. Hopefully, you have been able to spend time with your families and friends and have taken a fun-filled, restful break from your daily routines. However, framing our summer has been a series of tragic events. Within a few week period, we observed the heart wrenching shooting by a police officer of a young black man in front of his girlfriend and her four year old child; another black man shooting by a white police officer; and then our beautiful city of Dallas was struck by the brutal, targeted killings of five white police officers, and injuries to eight other officers and two civilians. These are beside the shootings and riots that have occurred all too frequently over the recent past. The mass shooting at Sandy Hook elementary school, the mass shooting at a club in Orlando where individuals had gathered to enjoy an evening of music and friendship, the mass shooting of police officers in Baton Rouge, and on and on and on. We are all heartbroken, but even more, we are confused. We are all looking for answers.

What are the issues here? Is there still racism in our country? Is there inability for black and whites to get along? Are guns too easily accessible? Is there lack of respect for the police who put their lives on the line everyday to protect the citizens of this city and throughout the country? Are police officers guilty as accused of discrimination or are they asked to do too much and thus unable to use good judgement in stressful times? Are we all unable to truly listen to each other when we communicate? Is mental illness not being addressed? Is there not enough support for our veterans when they return from across the world where they have protected our incredible country? Or is there a little or a lot of all of the above?

As Martin Luther King, Jr. stated, "The ultimate measure of man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy." NCJW's sole mission is Tikkun Olam, Judaism's mandate to each of us to engage in the repair of the world. How do we do that during a time of such unrest, hatred and issues that we sometimes just do not understand? Whether we are addressing reproductive justice, as we will at our Opening Meeting, human trafficking in our city, or how to reduce gun violence, it is more important than ever that we learn together how to address these critical issues at a time of challenge and controversy. In a Presidential election year like none other, one riddled with hate, confusion, and fear-mongering, it is more important than ever to get eligible individuals out to vote. In coalition with Temple Emanu-El, League of Women Voters, and a number of faith-based groups, this summer we deputized over 70 NCJW members so that this fall they will register voters at five NCJW-sponsored locations. And, of course, it is more important than ever to have your financial support. Our Birthday Luncheon, our major fundraiser, will be held January 31, 2017. Erin Brockovich will be our guest speaker and her message is "One woman can make a change."

We are about to embark on the High Holy Day period, where in this season in the Jewish calendar, we are asked to take time for reflection and for introspection. Let each of us take a moment to think about NCJW's mission, what we have experienced this summer and how as members of this incredible organization, we can make a difference. I encourage each of you to join the work that we do everyday to improve the lives of those most in need in our community. Hand in hand, we will ensure that NCJW continues to be that organization that finds ways to create a world that is what we want for all women, children, and families. Whether a time of comfort and convenience or time of challenge and controversy, you can help make this happen.

To you and your families, La Shana Tova, and may the coming year 5777 be filled with health, joy, happiness, prosperity and most of all peace and understanding.

Promote the Vote, Protect the Vote

For decades, NCJW members and supporters across the country have worked to encourage civic engagement by registering voters, educating communities, and getting out the vote on Election Day. NCJW advocates have also long pursued the expansion and protection of voting rights for historically disenfranchised individuals and communities through the suffrage movement, the struggle to end poll taxes, the campaign to pass the Voting Rights Act (VRA), the effort to change the voting age to 18, the Help America Vote Act of 2002, and now the campaign to pass the Voting Rights Advancement Act (VRAA), among other efforts.

Today, NCJW's work to promote civic engagement takes the form of Promote the Vote, Protect the Vote. This exciting initiative mobilizes NCJW sections, members, and supporters to work, in accordance with the rules governing 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organizations, to ensure that all eligible voters are able to vote and that every vote is counted. Visit ncjw.org/vote for more information.

Without the protections of the Voting Rights Act in place in Texas and other states, we have seen legislation passed that discriminates against minority and low income voters. For this presidential election, 17 states will have new voting restrictions in place for the first time.

Restrictive laws with such ID requirements have no place in a democracy where every individual in the nation is supposed to enjoy equal access to the ballot. These onerous changes can't be justified by the sudden, unwarranted concern for potential fraud. In fact voter identification fraud is virtually nonexistent in Texas and elsewhere as the Fifth Circuit just decided.

The only way to ensure equal access to the ballot is to give back to the Justice Department and the courts the power they had before *Shelby*, when the US Supreme Court's decision in *Shelby v. Holder* effectively dismantled much of the federal Voting Rights Act by striking down its pre-clearance provisions that protected voters from discriminatory changes in state and local voting laws and practices.

To ensure the right to vote, The Voting Rights Advancement Act introduced by Sens. Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and John Lewis (D-GA) would go a long way toward that goal. It updates the federal response to voting discrimination that has evolved in the 50 years since the Voting Rights Act was first passed, and it creates a new preclearance process which allows the Attorney General to send federal observers in response to any substantial risk of racial discrimination at the polls.

Food + Fit = Fun is on the Go!



What is Eating Well is a SNAP? Two years ago, at a Dallas Coalition for Hunger Solutions' program aimed at increasing senior participation in SNAP (Senior Nutrition Assistance Program – food stamps), the Greater Dallas Section's Food + Fit = Fun team (**Kyra Effren, Liz Cooper, Sharan Goldstein, Robin Zweig, Marlene Cohen** plus assistance from **Roz Katz**) presented a modified FFF program to attendees. The program included FFF's handouts plus physical activity and cooking demonstrations. The audience gave it rave reviews!

Since that time, Kyra and Marlene have joined with other Coalition members on the Coalition's Senior Hunger Action Team to create a presentation, Eating Well is a SNAP! (EWS), that focuses on learning how to eat well and stay on a budget (FFF components), increasing awareness of available food resources and increasing senior SNAP participation. In addition to NCJW, sponsors include The City of Dallas, Texas Hunger Initiative, Jewish Family Service of Greater Dallas, North Texas Food Bank, The Concilio and Senior Source.

Why is this important? Senior hunger is a growing problem across the country and here in Dallas. There are programs available to help seniors that are not being fully utilized. Since about only one-third of seniors eligible for SNAP are receiving those benefits, the Hunger Team developed the EWS Presentation to ensure that seniors receive all the SNAP benefits for which they are eligible.

Do you like cooking and nutrition? Do you enjoy public speaking? Do you care about the well-being of seniors in our community? If you've answered yes, then EWS wants you!

EWS has been presented at several senior living apartment complexes and is ready to expand. More volunteer presenters are needed. Kyra, our Section's cooking and nutrition maven, will lead the Train-the-Trainer sessions.

End of Term Supreme Court Decisions

The final decisions of the 2015-2016 Supreme Court had some winners and losers for our causes. The cases covered a wide range of issues from tort claims on Indian lands, affirmative action in college admissions, immigration status, contraceptive coverage by religious institutions, firearm possession and domestic violence, redistricting, and operation of abortion clinics.

In *Dollar General v. Choctaw Indians* the Court upheld in a 4-4 decision the 5th Circuit decision that Dollar General is subject to the jurisdiction of the Tribal Court to hear the sexual assault case of a 13 year old Choctaw boy by a manager of the Dollar General Store on Indian land.

In *United States v. Texas* a deadlocked court let stand the lower court ruling blocking President Obama's 2014 executive action to implement DAPA (Deferred Actions for Parents of Americans and Lawful Permanent Residents) and to expand DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals). The case is now back in the lower court to be heard on the merits.

In *Fisher v. University of Texas* the Court upheld UT's race conscious admissions program. In a 4-3 decision Justice Kennedy reaffirmed the principle of diversity.

In *Evenwel v. Abbott* the Court held in a unanimous decision that the Equal Protection Clause allows districts to be drawn based on population not the number of voters as the Plaintiffs had argued.

In *Voisine v. United States* the Court held that a misdemeanor crime that requires only a showing of recklessness qualifies as a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence under federal statutes 18 U.S.C. §§ 921(a)(33)(A) and 922(g)(9). This prevents those convicted of misdemeanor domestic violence from buying or possessing a firearm.

In *Whole Woman's Health v. Hellerstedt* in a 4-3 decision the Court held that Texas's H.B.2 did not confer medical benefits that are sufficient to justify the burdens they impose on women seeking to exercise their constitutional right to an abortion. Therefore, the provisions unconstitutionally impose an undue burden.

In *Zubik v. Burwell* the court deadlocked on the three issues presented regarding the implementation of the Affordable Care Act's portion providing contraceptive coverage and the Religious Freedom Restoration Act. The Court remanded the case to the lower courts to afford the parties the opportunity to determine how to proceed in a manner that grants employees full contraceptive coverage while also respecting the organizations' religious exercise.

These cases show the division of the Court on various issues and the harm being done by the failure to fill the vacancy left by Justice Scalia's death.
